

A Homeless Person Saved by the Contribution of the Members

A few months ago when the Kkottongnae ambulance visited Daejeon Station, a drunken homeless was found unconscious on the ground. It was said that he hurt his head in a fight with someone. We took encephalography as soon as we brought him to the Kkottongnae hospital, where we found a large amount of cerebral hemorrhage in his brain. An emergency transfer to Gangnam Catholic Hospital, which allowed for brain surgery with tracheotomy, saved his life. He has gradually recovered, now is able to walk and help other patients in the hospital room. The reason why we were able to save a life like this is because we have treated the valuable contributions of the members with management principles, not ownership motives. We brought the patient in with the ambulance bought with our members' contribution, diagnosed him in the Kkottongnae hospital which was donated by Jinro Company, and put him through an operation at a large hospital with the money sent in by Kkottongnae members.

The better we manage the properties and funds to be used efficiently for the poor and the sick, the more material blessings we receive and the richer Kkottongnae becomes.

The Last Regret

Man's desire to possess is endless.

A grandfather who was on his deathbed fell into one last state of regret. With the lower half of his body paralyzed from an automobile accident and dependent on an artificial anus from colectomy, he was in critical condition, developing various complications. Just before he

entered Kkottongnae, he gave all the money he'd received in compensation for the accident to the caregiver at the hospital.

As he himself would not need any money at Kkottongnae, while the caregiver would in order to support a large family, he gave her the money without condition, moved by her sincere care. Then his ex-girlfriend whom he used to live with, suddenly appeared and persuaded him to sue the caregiver to return the money, saying, "Why did you give the large sum of money to a random person? I will make you happy after we reclaim the money." Though face-to-face with death, he regrettably yielded, suing the caregiver, and the police ran an investigation. The night before he passed away, when I visited him in the sickroom, he said, beating his chest, "I' m so frustrated. I am full of evil. Please help me."

I said to him, "Don' t try to get the money back. You have to rise above self-interest and be content with the fact that the money is being used by a person who needs it the most." Then we prayed for the grandfather to win over his last temptation. The grandfather told us that he would throw away the greed in his mind, and he would be fine if the money is used by someone who needs it. His face considerably brightened after our prayer, and he said he felt much better.

The next day he passed away peacefully.
